Season's Greetings from Consulate General of Japan in Seattle

Happy New Year!

2022 was still filled with challenges, but also progress, as the world tried to turn towards a new normal state of operations.

In June, Ambassador Tomita and Governor Inslee extended the Memorandum of Cooperation on Economic and Trade Relations between the Government of Japan and the State of Washington, which was initially signed in 2016. This renewal aims to further develop cooperation between Japan and Washington State.

Commemorating the 65th anniversary of the sister city relationship between Seattle and Kobe and the 40th anniversary of the sister state relationship between Montana and Kumamoto, delegations traveled between Japan and the United States to further strengthen cultural and economic ties.

Furthermore, 2022 marked both the 80th anniversary of Executive Order 9066, which authorized the internment of Japanese and Japanese Americans during World War II, and the 120th anniversary of The North American Post. During a critical time in history as formerly incarcerated Japanese and Japanese Americans were returning home from the internment camps, The North American Post was a valuable resource for disseminating news to the local Japanese and Japanese American community. Since my arrival in Seattle, I have learned about the rich history of Japanese Americans in the Northwest. Consequently, my gratitude has deepened for their dedication and sacrifice in laying the foundation for the friendship between the U.S. and Japan that exists today. The North American Post continues to be a valuable resource for sharing news and preserving these important stories from the Nikkei community for future generations.

Shifting to world affairs, Russia's invasion of Ukraine last February was an outrageous act that shook the foundations of the international order that human beings have built after WWII. As the security of Japan and the surrounding region becomes increasingly uncertain, the Japan-U.S. alliance has become more important than ever, as have people-to-people exchanges between Japan and the U.S, one of the pillars of the alliance, together with security and economic relations.

On August 21, 2020, I arrived as a Consul General in Seattle during COVID-19 pandemic worldwide. Since that day, I have folded a crane and posted it on Instagram, one by one every day, to pray for health and peace of everyone who is having a lot of hardships with the pandemic. This spring, Russia's invasion of Ukraine began, and I have been praying for even more daily peace.

As you all know, Sadako Sasaki, who was exposed at the age of two at her home in Kusunoki-cho (Nishi-ku), about 1.6 km from the center of the bomb in Hiroshima, was blown away by the blast but was fine without any trauma. Although she was growing up, she was diagnosed with leukemia in the sixth grade of elementary school and was forced to be hospitalized at the Hiroshima Red Cross Hospital. While she was in the hospital, she received a thousand paper cranes from Nagoya as a sympathy for her, and she started folding her cranes with the desire to "live."

After eight months of hospitalization, she died of myeloid leukemia on October 25, 1955. Three years after Sadako died, on May 5, 1958, at Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park, the "Children's Peace Monument" was unveiled as a memorial to the deaths of Sadako and other children who were victims of the atomic bomb. The wish for peace has spread to all over the world. I have heard that the number has increased even more since US President Barack Obama visited Hiroshima in 2016.

The devastation that occurred in Hiroshima and Nagasaki, and the suffering that caused it, should never be repeated in anywhere in the world.

The G7 Hiroshima Summit will be held from May 19 to 21, 2023. The Summit will clearly show a strong commitment to the world that we will never repeat the devastation of nuclear weapons and the firm rejection of military invasion. The Summit will be held in a place where the G7 can demonstrate its will to lead in creating a new order of relations based on the fundamental values and international rules with a historical significance.

I hope that through the paper cranes, what happened in Hiroshima and Nagasaki will spread to the world and lead to world peace, and I wish for peace with the crane.

In 2023, I am optimistic about overcoming the challenges of the past two years and ready to get back to prepandemic levels of activity related to economy and culture. Two celebrations that will hopefully increase opportunities to boost these sectors are the 60th anniversary of the sister state relationship between Washington and Hyogo and the 100th anniversary of the Japan-America Society of the State of Washington. Further bolstering the economic front, APEC-related ministerial meetings will be held in Seattle in August.

While making the most of these opportunities, we will keep striving to promote Japan in Washington State, Northern Idaho, and Montana, and help further strengthen ties through exchanges in business, culture, tourism, and education. I wish you all a healthy, happy, and prosperous year.

The 77th Atomic Bomb Victims Memorial Service

Our club co-hosted the 77th Atomic Bomb Victims Memorial Service with Seattle Betsuin Buddhist Temple on Aug. 7th. A PowerPoint presentation of utter destruction and human casualties in Hiroshima and Nagasaki

after the first and second atomic bomb explosions in August 1945, was shown reminding us of its enormous and instantaneous destructive power. The interview video of Mr. Gene Fujita, an A-bomb survivor in Hiroshima, was presented. We were honored to listen to a special peace message by Japanese Consul General, Mr. Hisao Inagaki. Hiroshima Governor Mr. Hidehiko Yuzaki sent us his peace message which was read by Dale Kaku (in English) and by Namekata (in Japanese). We also appreciated Rev. Don Castro's thoughtful message. We thank Betsuin Temple staff, particularly Temple's president Ms. Leanne Nishi-Wong, for preparing and organizing this important event. - The applicant is graduating from high school and the latest high school transcript reflects a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or higher.
- Scholarship recipients must be present at the Club's annual general membership meeting, on March 4, 2023 in Bellevue.
- Application with all required documents to be postmarked on or before February 11, 2023.



- (2) lived in the United States for 30 years or longer; and
- (3) never received a certificate of commendation before.

Even if some members and/or their ancestors were not from Hiroshima Prefecture, they are qualified if they satisfied the three criteria above. If anyone is interested in receiving the governor's certificate of commendation, please fill out the form below and return it to our club as soon as possible. The deadline is January 25, 2023. The certificate will be presented during our club's new year party on Saturday, March 4, 2023.
